MAY 2022 NOTABLE BURIAL



Thomas F. Enright

May, 8th 1887 - November, 3rd 1917 Saint Mary's Cemetery

THOMAS FRANCIS ENRIGHT was born in Pittsburgh, PA, the son of Irish immigrants. He enlisted in the U.S. Army in 1909 and was one of the first three Americans to be killed in action. A few months after he arrived in France, German soldiers attacked the Americans in their Artois trenches in the predawn hours of Nov. 3, 1917. The Americans were vastly outnumbered and engaged in hand-to-hand battle with the enemy. By the end of the encounter, three Americans soldiers had been killed. Private Thomas F. Enright, Corporal James Gresham, and Private Merle D. Hay were buried on the battlefield where they fell. Over 100,000 Americans would follow them in death less than one year later.



Did you know?

The poppy is a symbol of Memorial Day.

In the war-torn fields of European battlegrounds after World War I, the red field poppy was the first plant to reappear. Its seeds had been spread all over these fields by the wind, and once the ground was disturbed by the fighting, they germinated. Canadian solider and physician John McCrae was inspired by these flowers to write *In Flanders Fields*, a famous war-time poem.



"In Flanders Fields"



We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders fields.
